Government Regulations that all future payments of the—of zemindars are to be made in paper, i.e., in certificates by the Accountant-General to the Revenue Department to be granted to them with interest at the 4 per cent. per annum and payable at 300 days after sight, except the restored zemindars who would receive papers without interest.

Mr. Darnwood appointed by Government to take charge of the certificates granted to zemindars for—land pension not paid by the Resident of the Durbar, for which he was to be paid consideration of 5 per cent. on the amount of payments.

Bihar and Bengal. Minutes by Mr. Macdonald Member proposing resumption or reduction of the—of restored zemindars, on the ground that it was granted to them when they were dispossessed of their lands by the Committee of Oudh in 1772, and that the charges of zemindars or zemindary allowance fall within the head of Revenue charges, the reduction of which Committee was instructed by Court of Directors to effect, pointing out the arbitrary distribution of the amount among the zemindars of Burdwan, Beerbhoom and Nadia.
